Grab a Pass and Go

One of the best benefits of your Friends' membership is the ability to access our free or reduced-price museum passes. Only Friends can reserve these passes up to two weeks in advance so they will be there when you choose to go. We recently added the following attractions to this program and hope you will take the time to head out and explore our area:

Historic New England

It's mission is to save and share New England's past to engage and inform present and future generations. Historic New England operates a number of properties around New England. These include historic homes, farms, and gardens. One interesting property you can visit nearby is the Roseland Cottage in Woodstock, CT. This Gothic Revival home, built in 1846, is known for its colorful pink exterior. Four US presidents have been guests here. This pass provides free admission to 2 adults and their children at any one of its properties. Go to www.historicnewengland.org for a full list of properties.

New England Botanic Garden at Tower Hill

Experience the wonder of plants at a botanic garden in Boyleston, MA. It is open to the public year-round for garden viewing, trail walking, educational programs, exhibitions, and more. The Garden includes conservatories, formal and naturalistic gardens, a Garden Shop, café, and expansive views of the Wachusett Reservoir. The pass provides for 2 half-price admissions. Worcester Historical Museum

Any local history fans out there? A few examples of WHM's holdings include correspondence of abolitionist Abby Kelley Foster, Blackstone Canal Company records, Civil War era diaries and letters, and artifacts including early woodenware and ceramics, weaponry from the colonial era through World War II, paintings and sculptures, and a significant costume and textile collection.
