Then the *Friends of the Joshua Hyde Public Library* has just the opportunity for you!

While our 2020 Membership Drive is winding down, and we wholeheartedly appreciate every single member we have, we are also very much in need of some hands-on help. The money raised from our Membership Drive, Book Sales, and other fundraisers allows us to provide all of the programs our community enjoys at the library FREE OF CHARGE, but without people to oversee those programs, there will be no more *Friends*. Just think about that: no more Summer Reading Program; no story times for the kids; no Book Discussions or Winter Movie programs for the adults; no free Museum Passes; no extra equipment to loan out to patrons; and the list goes on and on. Without the *Friends*, the library that you know will be a vastly different place.

The Board of the Friends is composed of only a handful of people, putting in a few precious hours of their time each month. Right now, *out of the four Board positions, only one is filled*! Jane Zavistoski has been the driving force behind this organization. She has been the acting Treasurer for the past few years while we have tried to find someone to fill her shoes. This job would require some knowledge of accounting or bookkeeping and experience with QuickBooks, Excel, and Word would be great also. A laptop is provided. Ideally, the candidate will also be able to attend monthly Board meetings. This job would require approximately 10 hours of time each month. If you think this position would work for you, please reach out and Jane can fill you in on the specifics of the job.

We are also in need of a **Vice President**. The Vice President backs up the other positions, helps out as needed

and stands in for the President as required. This person should also ideally be able to make the monthly Board meetings. The position would only require 3 to 5 hours of time each month.

She has been bringing her two children, Ethan and Zoey, to the library to partake of the many programs offered for years. 
READING Soul food

re you reading as hungrily as I am during these challenging times? Nothing feeds the soul like a good book. I have always known this, but it took a pandemic and quarantine to find out just how important book are in my life.

Thanks heavens for my library book sale stash when everything closed down last spring. I revisited favorite author Jan Karon and in the midst of the daily terrible news I was transported book after book to the magical town of Mitford in the hills of North Carolina and enjoyed their delightful and eccentric residents and simple lives. Pure pleasure, pure escape.

I keep a running list of books I have read, thanks to the clever suggestion of my friend Sharon, and I now see that I read every bookshop book available. The Bookshop on the Shore by Jenny Colgan set in Scotland, The Little Bookshop on the Seine by Rebecca Raisin, The Secret, Book, and Scone Society by Ellery Adams, The Lost and Found Bookshop by Susan Wiggs, and The Printed Letter Bookshop by Katherine Reay. Obviously, I am not

the only reader who finds pleasure and comfort at a bookshop.



I moved on to the newly opened magnificent NYC Library in the early 20th century in The Lions of Fifth Avenue by Fiona Davis. Travelling to other places and times, especially times of historical challenge, felt fascinating and insightful. All the Ways We Said Goodbye by Beatriz Williams, Lauren Willig, and Karen White introduced me to the courage of 3 women dealing with WWI and WWII and yet always pivoting back to the Paris Ritz. Escapism, but also lessons in resilience.

Oh, there were the books set by the sea while I spent a landlocked summer in Sturbridge. A Week at the Shore by Barbara Delinsky was set in Westerly, RI, 28 Summers by Elin Hilderband and Girls of Summer by Nancy Thayer both set in Nantucket, The Salt House by Lisa Duffy set on the Maine coast, and Tea and Treachery, a fine cozy mystery, was set in Wellfleet and on Cape Cod.

What was it about bees this summer? A Honeybee Heart Has Five Openings by Helen Jukes was a fascinating memoir and meditation on

nature in our lives. I followed up with two novels by Susan Wiggs, old favorites, *The Apple Orchard* and *The Beekeeper's Ball*.

Luncheon of the Boating Party by Susan Vreeland danced across the pages once again for me, Renoir and his fellow painters showing how to live with passion and purpose and creativity after the horrors of war in Paris in the mid 1800's.

I have read for delightful times in beautiful locations including Lunch in Paris and Picnic in Provence by Elizabeth Bard and Susan Branch's trilogy starting with A Fine Romance set in the English countryside and finishing with Martha's Vineyard Isle of Dreams.

I stretched with the powerful novel set in Hawaii called *The Color of Air* by Gail Tsukiyama, set in the time of a volcanic eruption near a small island

village, and looked to a powerful 1935 hurricane (historically correct) that alters the lives of many in The "Our library is my Last Train to Key West by Chanel

May I suggest that when all else fails in these dark times...watch and I am so thankful

the PBS series The Durrells of Corfu (yes all 4 seasons available on DVD via CWMars) and read the book which prompted the series My Family and Other

Animals by Gerald Durrell. During my binge watching and reading set on this lovely Greek Isle in the years before WWII, I found that on bleak days I would simply tell my husband he could reach me only on Corfu... days I would simply tell my husband he could reach me only on Corfu... escapism at its best.

Oh, I have read inspirational books, When the Heart Waits by Sue Monk Kidd, Following the Path by Joan Chittister, Radical Compassion by Tara Brach, Women Rowing North by Mary Piper. All strong women who helped and guided me.

Our library is my lifeline these days and I am so thankful that the Joshua Hyde is up and running and always helpful with such a caring and friendly staff. I have stocked up for the winter ahead with the Friends library book sale books.

Our book discussions as I have known then for 28 years rest quiet at the moment after two delightful outdoor meetings where we shared our best readings of the summer past. History, inspiration, memoir and biography, challenging novels, fantasy and science fiction, current events and social action all were well represented and the time shared was a treasure.

The bandstand on the Common awaits our next in-person connection, perhaps next spring. Until then, I will read away through the winter ahead and continue to fill my soul.



The Friends Income and Expense Report End of fiscal year August 30, 2020

The Friends started the year with \$48,436 with \$24,904 in the Operating Fund and \$23,532 as Restricted Funds. We had income of \$9,207 with 51% from Membership, 20% Book Sales, 23% Fundraisers and donations, and 6% from Miscellaneous sources.

Our Operating expenses were \$8,825 with 51% for Library Programs, 21% Museum Passes and 28% for Administration and Miscellaneous. After a transfer of \$5,000 to the Library Renovation Restricted fund we ended with an Operating Fund balance of \$20,285.

The Restricted Funds started the year with \$23,532 with \$17,000 in the Library renovation fund, \$3,362 in the Rotary Donation Fund and \$3,170 in Mary White Memorial Fund.

The year ended with a Restricted Fund balance of \$7,298 - with \$3,005

in the Renovation fund, \$2,293 in the Rotary Fund \$2,293 and \$2,000 in the Mary White Fun.

At year end we had a total of \$27,583 in our bank account.
